

Every edition has its specific topics. Since April 2019 edition, Parole has a new policy in publishing articles. In short, from the content side, this edition has more focused on micro linguistics than the macro one. However, from the country where the topics are discussed, this edition is presenting the linguistic issues in four different countries namely Indonesia, Malaysia, Bangladesh, and China. This indicates the universality of language use in human life.
