The original articles in this issue demonstrate a diversity of contributions that arise from the field of psychology. **Aisyah and Agung** found to show a positive correlation between forgiveness and adolescent friendship intimacy, particularly in males. In terms of online activities, adolescences' excessive online self-disclosure is now a social phenomenon arising in social media use. **Rahardjo and colleagues** found personality factors and adolescent perceptions of the low privacy risk on social media. Maintaining social relations with other social media members encourages them to be more online to disclose social media.

Frislia and Handoyo found self-construal and goal orientation have a positive effect on innovative work behavior. Individuals with goal orientations can help organizations to develop innovation through creative work behavior. This article is beneficial for the human resources area. Meanwhile, **Putri and Etikariena** reviewed in detail in their studies about work-family conflict issues. They found that policymakers must invest in a work-family culture because such culture is expected to give optimum advantages on well-being at work.

In higher education, **Marella and Prasetyawati** found the problems "Worrying about examination" and "Fearing in failure in college" were significantly associated with psychological distress in international students. Providing academic counselor then become imperative. Further, **Sagita and colleagues** found fresh graduates need to have work readiness as one of the essential attributes. They developed Indonesian work readiness scale for undergraduates. The result shown has good validity and reliability.

Early childhood development (ECD) has long-life effects on an individual, that were essential for human kind, **Purwanti and her colleagues** found significant association between the psychosocial stimulation and nutritional status to the cognitive development. From a parenting perspective, parental teamwork is essential. **Sumargi and colleagues** proved it in their study, mothers' authoritative parenting on child emotional problems, and significant effects of fathers' authoritative and authoritarian parenting on child behavioral problems.

Finally, I take this opportunity to acknowledge the contribution of Managing Editor and Assistant Editors during the final editing of articles published. I would also like to express my gratitude to all the readers, authors, reviewers, for their support in bringing out yet another issue of Jurnal Psikologi UNDIP.
