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EDITORIAL NOTE

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Welcome to the April 2023 edition. In this edition, you will read seven selected articles that have gone through extensive reviews from reviewers.

From family relationship, **Dewi and her colleagues**, conducted a qualitative study with a case study design on eight mothers and youth from divorced families to highlight the dynamics of gender construction in divorced families. The study's findings show that the gender scheme developed by youth is linked to patterns of interaction in the family after the parents' divorce. Changes in parent roles and the presence of extended families contribute to their gender construction. The presence of a responsible father is considered important for young people.

From developmental issues, we divide in two big population, from adolescent population, **Puspitaningrum and Pudjiati** focused on dynamic resilience in the adolescent population. Their study analyzed the effect of each source of perceived social support on adolescent resilience in Tangerang Regency. The results showed that perceived social support was a predictor of adolescent resilience, and female adolescents feel more supported by friends compared to male adolescents. **Alfaruqy and Indrawati** portrayed the phenomenon of quarter-life crisis among individuals with suicidal intentions. The study found that acceptance from parents, peer group social support, and professional assistance are essential in the process of recovering from the quarter-life crisis. This research has implications for the urgency of communication and harmonious relations in the early adulthood phase, especially emerging adulthood. Further, in their experimental studies, **Jati et al** investigated the effectiveness of the emotional experience writing (EXPRIT) model in enhancing the problem-solving skills among adolescents with social-emotional problems in orphanages. Even though, this current study was limited by its small sample size. These findings highlight the importance of targeted interventions in addressing the needs of orphaned youth dealing with socio-emotional problems. Specific among university side, **Rifameutia and Malay** investigated the validity and reliability of SACQ (Student Adaptation to College Questionnaire), an adapted version of Bahasa Indonesia. The result shows this adaptation version is valid and reliable and can be widely used to measure the level of college adjustment. From children population, **Rahmawati's** study revealed the risk factors that cause Problematic Internet Use (PIU) in elementary students with moderate to very high Problematic Internet Use (PIU) scores as participants. She found that interpersonal skills and achievement motivation can explain the emergence of PIU. These results need to be highlighted by education in schools,

especially Guidance and Counseling teachers or counselors expected to be able to provide preventive and curative services, to maintain optimal growth and development in children.

From the working context, **Rahmi et al.** adapted the Work Regulatory Focus Scale to an Indonesian version. The findings indicate that the Work Regulatory Focus has good psychometric properties and provides support for its applicability in the Indonesian context.
